


# 26TH CONGREGATION





Ho Technical University started as a Technical Institute in 1968 with the primary objective of providing pre-technical education. By 1972, the Institute upgraded its courses, resulting in the expansion of the pre-technical programmes into courses in engineering and vocational fields such as Basic Engineering, Agricultural Mechanical Engineering. Building Technology, Fashion, Hospitality Management and Business Education.

In 1986, the Institute became a Polytechnic. It however continued to operate as second cycle institution, until 1993, when the Polytechnic was upgraded to a fully-fledged tertiary institution by the enactment of PNDC Law 321 and charged with the responsibility of training students in the technical and vocational skills to the Higher National Diploma [HND] level.

Subsequently, in 2007, Polytechnics were given the mandate by the Polytechnics Act 745, to award their own degrees to the highest level.

Ho Technical University has the mandate to award degrees, diplomas, certificates and other qualications to the highest level in Engineering, Science and Technology based disciplines, Technical and Vocational Education and Training, Applied Arts and related disciplines.



#### STRATEGIC MANDATE



#### Hospitality & Tourism Management (HTM) as Niche Area

The University remains committed to promoting its niche area by equipping students with the skills and knowledge necessary to make significant contributions to the growth, sustainability, and innovation of the hospitality and service industries. Our unwavering commitment to the niche area has not only strengthened our academic offerings but also earned us various local and international awards, further affirming our leadership and excellence in the field.

Currently, the University offers the following programmes aligned with the niche area:

- HND. Hotel, Catering, and Institutional Management.
- Diploma in Hospitality Management.

In our commitment to furthering the niche area, the Department of Hospitality and Tourism Management (HTM) also initiated programmes aimed at adopting and developing various tourist sites in the Volta Region, including the Wli Water Falls and the Tafi Monkey Sanctuary. These initiatives also involved enhancing the skills and expertise of the members of the Hoteliers and Chef Association of Ghana, among others.

#### Update on Fabrication Laboratory at HTU

Following the establishment of the Fabrication Laboratory (Fab Lab) at Ho Technical University (HTU), the institution embarked on an exciting journey of innovation and practical learning as part of our international collaboration and joint research project initiatives with the Rhine-Waal University of Applied Sciences (HSRW). With funding from DAAD, this project has proven instrumental in enhancing innovation and research capabilities of our students. To ensure the seamless operation and efficient management of the Fab some faculty and staff participated comprehensive hands-on training programmes in Germany. In addition to the training conducted abroad, on-campus training programmes and workshops have been organized for faculty and staff, focusing on the practical applications of the Fab Lab. Also, a female engineer from the Department of Electrical/Electronic Engineering has been nominated to travel to Germany in December 2025 for further training on the facility's use and operations. Looking ahead, a Fab Lab Academy will be launched in the next academic year to provide specialized training for faculty, staff and students. This Academy will serve as a hub for creativity and innovation, offering workshops and courses tailored to enhance skills in modern fabrication techniques and design thinking. By fostering a hands-on learning environment, the initiative aims to inspire the next generation of innovators to lead in technology and entrepreneurship.

#### New Architectural Technology Studios

Two (2) new Architectural Technology Studios have been established for the Department of Architectural and Real

Estate Management to enhance the educational experience for students enrolled in the Architectural Technology programme at HTU. The studios serve as collaborative spaces where students engage in hands-on projects, workshops, and group discussions, fostering a sense of community among peers and encouraging teamwork. The studios also serve as a platform for faculty and industry practitioners to provide mentorship, guidance, and insights into current trends and best practices. The provision of this modern learning environment reflects the University's commitment to supporting the academic and professional growth of our students.



#### Resourcing of Automobile Workshop

As part of efforts to retool the Automobile Workshop during the period under review, the University acquired a modern vehicle diagnostic tool, the Autel MaxilM IM608S equipment. This advanced vehicle diagnostic equipment is designed to improve students' practical training experiences while also elevating the service delivery standards within the workshop. The Autel MaxilM IM608S features an extensive database of vehicle coverage, enabling students to diagnose a wide range of makes and models accurately. This tool aids in identifying faults and troubleshooting and also provides users with advanced functionalities such as key programming and service resets. This also offers our students the to familiarize themselves opportunity industry-standard diagnostic practices, ensuring they remain competitive in the job market upon graduation.

#### Retooling of Welding Laboratory

In alignment with the strategic objectives outlined in the HTU Strategic Plan (2023-2027), the Welding Laboratory within the Department of Mechanical Engineering was retooled with cutting-edge technology and advanced machinery. This initiative was implemented to enhance our educational offerings in welding, fabrication, and pipe-fitting, and to ultimately prepare our students for successful careers in these critical fields. All relevant equipment and machinery have already been delivered and installed. By investing in these critical resources, the University is ensuring that its curriculum remains relevant, continually aligned with industry standards, and effectively prepares students for the demands of the job market. This strategic enhancement also aims to cultivate a more competent workforce within the fields of Welding, Design, and Manufacturing. HTU is grateful to the Government of Ghana through the Commission for Technical and Vocational Education and Training (CTVET) for funding the project.

#### The University Library

Management remains committed to ensuring that the University Library continues to provide a wide range of services that improve access to current resources, including an extensive selection of both physical and digital materials. These include e-books, academic

journals, and databases that are crucial for contemporary research. To further bolster these offerings, strategic budgetary allocations have been made towards upgrading our technological infrastructure, to enhance access to digital resources, and support advanced research initiatives.

Over the past year, the University procured three hundred (300) new pieces of furniture for the University Library. Management also deployed additional pieces from the University's existing inventory to optimize the layout and utility of the Library. Further, the professional capacity of the Library staff continues to grow. In alignment with the University's commitment to staff development, five (5) library staff were granted the opportunity to pursue further studies in relevant areas. One other faculty also completed her PhD programme within the period. These efforts reflect the University's ongoing dedication to enhancing the capabilities of personnel at the University Library.

Additionally, on 14<sup>th</sup> February, 2025, the University Library organized a Chocolate Day as part of efforts to encourage freshers and continuing students to patronize the library. Chocolates were distributed to individuals who visited the University Library. The event offered a warm and welcoming atmosphere, encouraging new students to explore the library facilities and discover the tools that could enhance their learning experience. By blending a fun social experience with educational outreach, the

This state-of-the-art facility features a remarkable selection of high-performance computers and advanced accessories designed to enhance teaching methods and enrich the educational experience for our students. The Digital Lab is equipped with the latest software and hardware, positioning it as a collaborative hub for both students and faculty. This innovative space not only supports the Computer Science curriculum but also aligns with the goals of various other departments across the University, promoting interdisciplinary learning and fostering innovation. We are excited about the positive influence this new facility is having on our educational practices and the overall learning outcomes for our students.

#### Outreach Programmes

In a strategic effort to enhance student enrolment in the University, Management instituted dedicated outreach teams focused on driving a series of comprehensive admission initiatives throughout the country. Comprised of both faculty and staff, these teams played a pivotal

role in actively engaging with prospective students and their families, showcasing the diverse programme offerings available at HTU. The outreach teams visited 86 second cycle institutions and participated in some educational fairs, which served as excellent avenues for disseminating information about the University. In fact, the impact of these initiatives has been significant over the period. The University has witnessed a notable increase in our admission figures over recent academic cycles, reflecting the effectiveness of our outreach efforts in raising awareness about the University's offerings. #### Commemoration of World Engineering Day



#### Food, Agriculture, Technology, and Sustainability (FATAS) Conference of the University

In line with Management's commitment to advancing research initiatives, the University hosted the Food, Agriculture, Technology, and Sustainability (FATAS) Conference from Monday, 17th November 2025, to Wednesday, 19th November, 2025. Under the theme "Rethinking the Future of Food and its Allied Systems in an Era of Sustainability and Circularity," the conference sought to foster collaboration among policymakers, researchers, industry experts, and development partners to explore innovative strategies for building sustainable food systems. The opening ceremony of the conference featured keynote addresses from Prof. Eric Yirenkyi Danquah, a Professor of Plant Genetics at the University of Ghana, and Prof. (Mrs.) Ibok Nsa Oduro, a Professor of Postharvest Technology at KNUST.

The Vice-Chancellor, Prof. Ben Q. Honyenuga, in his welcome address, reiterated the need for integration

of technology, innovation, and appropriate policies to create circular systems where waste becomes a resource, efficiency replaces excess, and sustainability becomes a standard.

The Minister for Food and Agriculture, Hon. Eric Opoku, who served as the Guest of Honour for the conference, commended Management, Faculty and Staff for their dedicated efforts. He also highlighted the government's vision and initiatives, particularly the Feed Ghana Programme, aimed at enhancing agricultural productivity and repositioning the sector as a key driver of economic growth. The conference drew the participation of numerous dignitaries, including the Volta Regional Minister, Hon. James Gunu, and the Ho Municipal Chief Executive, Hon. Stephen Adom among others. It also attracted international participants from Germany, UK, Finland, and Nigeria. It is worthy to note that Management is collaborating with the Taylor & Francis Group to publish the proceedings of the conference.

#### Improvement in Research Drive of Faculty

The University has been experiencing a significant improvement in its research visibility and output on major academic platforms such as Web of Science and Scopus. Notably, the number of research publications indexed in Scopus has shown remarkable growth, increasing from just 4 articles in 2012 to a total of 631 publications as of October, 2025.

#### Update on Establishment of a Centre of Excellence in Biomedical Engineering at HTU

As reported during the 25<sup>th</sup> Congregation, Ho Technical University has secured 2,148,015 Euros grant through a Call for Proposals from the Skills Initiative for Africa (SIFA), in partnership with the Lucas Nulle Group in Germany. This project aims to establish a Biomedical Engineering Centre that will enhance the employability of young people by providing hands-on training in the maintenance and repair of biomedical equipment. Given Ghana's significant demand for Biomedical Engineers, this initiative also aims to bridge the gap created by the shortage of skilled and qualified professionals in the sector.

By training a competent workforce capable of maintaining and repairing biomedical equipment, this project will play a vital role in improving healthcare delivery and ensuring that medical facilities receive the essential technical expertise they require. Indeed, this strategic investment in education and skills development is expected to have a lasting impact on the healthcare landscape in Ghana and beyond.

We wish to highlight that, all critical equipment for the establishment of the Biomedical Engineering Centre have been supplied by our partners, Lucas Nulle GmbH. We extend our immense gratitude to the AUDA- NEPAD, SIFA, and our partners Lucas Nulle GmbH, for the grant and support. We also wish to express our sincere appreciation to the Government of Ghana, through the Ministry of Finance and the Ministry of Education, for their support and assistance in granting the necessary tax exemptions that enabled the University to clear the goods at the Tema Port.

#### Update on Solar Technology Application Resource (STAR) Centre at HTU

In May 2023, the University took an important step to promote solar energy technologies in Ghana by signing an agreement with the Ministry of Energy and Green Transition and the International Solar Alliance (ISA). Since the establishment and commissioning of the STAR Centre at HTU, significant progress has been made toward the successful implementation of this innovative project. The STAR Centre is expected to serve as a centralized hub for the dissemination of advanced technology, knowledge, and expertise, addressing both national and regional needs. It focuses on four key functions: training, testing, innovation, and knowledge management. As part of the project implementation activities, the University collaborated with key stakeholders in the renewable energy sector to conduct virtual training programmes during the period. Under the theme "Empowering Workplaces with Government Solar Energy: Importance, Benefits, and Strategic Integration," these programmes targeted participants from various public institutions. The primary aim is to equip

them with practical knowledge and strategic insights regarding the deployment of solar energy solutions. These capacity building sessions are a crucial component of HTU's broader efforts to foster partnerships, build capacity, and promote sustainability-focused innovations that address both national and global energy challenges.

The Facilitators for these training programmes include Ing. Seth Mahu, a seasoned Energy Consultant and the Director of Renewable Energy and Green Transitions at the Ministry of Energy & Green Transition; Prof. Richard Turkson, the Dean of the School of Graduate Studies and Coordinator for the STAR-C at HTU; and Ing. Dr. Seth T.K. Dzokoto, a key member of the HTU STAR-C Team. The STAR-C is a tripartite partnership involving the ISA and its partners, Ministry of Energy and Green Transition as well as HTU. We are very grateful to the ISA and its partners, the Government of Ghana as well as the Ministry of Energy and Green Transition for their support in this regard.

#### Green Campus Project at HTU

Ho Technical University (HTU) has signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with the Korea Association of Machinery Industry (KOAMI) to advance our Green Campus agenda and strengthen collaboration in renewable energy and sustainable technologies. The partnership agreement, which follows earlier engagements between the two institutions, is aimed at positioning HTU as a model of sustainability in higher education and a leader in renewable energy innovation within the sub-region. The agreement focuses on key areas such as renewable energy infrastructure, research, training, and technology transfer. A major highlight of the partnership is the proposal to establish a Photovoltaic (PV) Certification Centre on the University campus. KOAMI will bring its expertise in green technologies and international cooperation to complement HTU's strides in renewable energy, especially through its Solar Technology Application Resource Centre (STAR-C), a flagship project of the International Solar Alliance in partnership with Ghana's Ministry of Energy and Green Transition. The project aligns with the University's mission and builds on its existing achievements in solar energy and

sustainability and would contribute to making the University more energy-efficient and environmentally friendly, while offering opportunities for research and student training.

Further, the MoU is expected to pave the way for pilot projects, workshops and infrastructure upgrades on campus, beginning with the PV Certification Centre. We are optimistic that the agreement will contribute significantly to reducing the University's carbon footprint, lowering energy costs and creating a practical model of sustainability that can be replicated across other institutions in the country and beyond. The Chief Director at the Ministry of Energy and Green Transition, Mr. Solomon Adjetey Sowah, and the Director for Renewable Energy at the Ministry of Energy and Green Transition, Ing. Seth Mahu, were present at the signing. As the National Certification Focal Institution (NCFI) for the ECOWAS Regional Certification Scheme for Sustainable Energy Skills (ECSES) and host of the Solar Technology Application Resource Centre (STAR-C) in Ghana, Ho Technical University is committed to leading initiatives that promote the use of renewable energy.

#### Update on the UNIDO Circular Economy Centre Project at HTU

Following the inauguration of the UNIDO-Ghana Circular Economy Centre at the Ho Technical University (HTU) on 23rd October 2024, several actions have been initiated to advance the implementation of the project. As Host Institution, and in alignment with our commitment to strengthen the strategic direction of the Ghana Circular Economy Centre, new Vision and Mission Statements that encapsulate our collective aspirations and long-term objectives have been developed for the Centre. It is important to note that a team from the Canadian High Commission and UNIDO also visited the University on 14th October 2025, to assess our progress on these implementation processes. In fact, the Ghana Circular Economy Centre (GCEC) aims to promote sustainability in agriculture and agro-processing, textiles, and plastics by advocating circular economy practices. Through innovative strategies, the project is designed to enhance

resource efficiency, minimize waste, and foster sustainable job creation, with a particular focus on empowering women and youth. This five-year initiative, funded by Global Affairs Canada, is being implemented by UNIDO in collaboration with the Ministry of Environment, Science, Technology, and Innovation (MESTI). The goal is to cultivate a circular economy that drives inclusive economic prosperity and supports a low-carbon economy, with a significant focus on benefiting women and youth in Ghana. As part of this initiative, the Kwame Nkrumah University of Science and Technology (KNUST), the University of Cape Coast (UCC), and The Or Foundation will serve as Value Chain Leads for agriculture and agro-processing, plastics, and textiles, respectively. Further, the newly appointed Executive Director of the UNIDO-Ghana Circular Economy Centre, Dr. Marindame Kombate, was formally introduced to Management at a brief ceremony on Monday, 3rd November 2025.

#### Update on HTU Baobab Project

The HTU Baobab Research Project has garnered significant local and international interest due to its innovative development of a new variety of baobab seedlings that mature in just 27 months. This ground-breaking advancement represents a shift towards more efficient and sustainable baobab cultivation practices, appealing to both agricultural communities and environmental advocates. In recognition of its pioneering work, the University has proudly joined the African Baobab Alliance, a collaborative network dedicated to promoting the sustainable use of baobab and ensuring its conservation. Furthermore, the project has received formal acknowledgement from the Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) of the United Nations, underscoring its importance in global efforts to support biodiversity and combat climate change. This recognition highlights the project's commitment to sustainable practices and the potential of baobab as a valuable resource for food security and nutrition.

To facilitate practical training and hands-on experience, two model baobab farms have been established; one located in the southern region of Ghana and the other in the Upper West Region. These initiative-driven farms have been funded by Atmosmare Foundation, a Finnish organization dedicated to supporting sustainable agricultural practices. The farms are strategically designed to serve as centers for knowledge exchange, where local farmers can learn about baobab cultivation techniques, including planting, harvesting, and processing. With a target of planting 2,000 baobab trees, this initiative aims not only to enhance food diversification but also to bolster climate resilience in the face of changing environmental conditions.

In a significant development, Mr. Esko Pettay from the Atmosmare Foundation visited HTU during the third quarter of 2025. This visit was pivotal, providing an opportunity for direct engagement with project stakeholders and a chance to assess the progress and impact of the initiative. Additionally, ongoing research activities with other local and international partners are being conducted to explore the full potential and long-term impact of the baobab project. These studies aim to uncover new insights into the ecological benefits of baobab trees, their role in local economies, and their contribution to sustainable agricultural practices.

#### Digital Skills Centre Project on Empowering Young People

Ho Technical University is collaborating with Plan International Ghana and its partners, including Nokia, NGIC, CENDLOS, and some other institutions, to establish a Digital Skills Centre. This initiative aims to empower young individuals, particularly women and persons with disabilities. The project will target a total of 360 young people; undergraduate IT students from tertiary institutions and recent graduates across three universities namely: University for Development Studies(UDS), Ho Technical University(HTU), and the University of Ghana (UG), over a three-year implementation period. The demographic will consist of 50% girls and 50% boys, including individuals with disabilities. The Digital Skills Centre project aims to digital skills acquisition, increase improve employability, and enhance entrepreneurial opportunities for young people. By addressing the digital skills gap, the project seeks to integrate participants into the digital economy, focusing on the latest technologies through the deployment of 5G infrastructure. It specifically targets young individuals with a background in technology, especially girls and persons with disabilities, who are eager to transform their theoretical knowledge into practical applications that will benefit their communities.

#### E4Impact Project - European Union (EU) -Ghana Pact for Skills Project

In response to a Call for Proposals and rigorous assessment processes, Ho Technical University (HTU) has been selected as one of the six (6) universities in Ghana to host the Green Entrepreneurship Acceleration and Incubation Programmes in partnership with E4Impact Foundation under the EU-Ghana Pact for Skills project, specifically for the Entrepreneurship Stream. We are excited to be a part of this initiative and appreciate the opportunity to contribute to the development of students and aspiring entrepreneurs to enhance the socio-economic development of our nation and beyond. The necessary agreements have been signed and Management has appointed a Programme Leader, Business Coach and critical Faculty to facilitate the implementation of the project in the University.

#### HTU - World Food Programme(WFP) Project

Ho Technical University has won a project of the World Food Programme (WFP), an autonomous joint subsidiary programme of the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations. The project aims to support the World Food Programme's (WFP) efforts in fostering sustainable development and resilience through graduate empowerment. A brand new tractor, a disc plough, two multipurpose threshers, two multipurpose drvers, and twenty-five boxes of assorted tools have been donated to the University as part of the project. Additionally. two existing tractors rehabilitated for the University. The World Food Programme (WFP) also disbursed the sum of GHS291,814.00 for the project's implementation in the University.

#### Gender Equality Partnerships Project

Ho Technical University is collaborating with the University of Nottingham (UoN), and the Association of African Universities (AAU) on the Gender Equality Project to help increase the number of female STEM

lecturers in leadership roles at Ghana's Technical Universities. Funded by the British Council, this project is part of global efforts to promote gender equality in academia. Running from January 2025 to February 2026, the project intends to inform evidence-based policies and create supportive initiatives that enhance research output and leadership skills among female academics. By the end of the project, we expect to see more women in leadership roles, stronger advocacv policy-making, and increased visibility for female lecturers, ultimately making Ghana's technical universities more inclusive and equitable.

#### Update on Ghana Skills Development Fund Projects

Ho Technical University is proud to have served as the consulting body for three (3) significant grant contracts awarded by the Commission for Technical and Vocational Education and Training (CTVET) to the Ghana National Association of Garages (GNAG). These grants were specifically allocated for training in three

(3) key trade areas, namely: Auto Mechanics, Auto Electricians, and Welders & Fabricators, all under the auspices of the Ghana National Association of Garages (GNAG). Over a span of six (6) months, these training programmes were meticulously designed and executed by the Department of Mechanical Engineering, with oversight from the HTU TVERC Centre. Each programme was designed to enhance the skills and practical knowledge of the participating artisans, ensuring they are well-equipped to meet industry demands and standards. The success of these initiatives highlights the collaborative efforts between Ho Technical University, GNAG, and CTVET in fulfilling the mission of advancing educational opportunities and promoting skill acquisition among artisans in Ghana. The initiatives also reflect the government's dedication to bolstering vocational training and workforce development in the automotive and fabrication sectors.

#### Update on 2024 Ghana Jobs & Skills Apprenticeship Programme (GJS-AP)

The University through the Technical Vocational Education and Resource Centre (TVERC) successfully implemented the first phase of the Ghana Jobs & Skills Apprenticeship Programme (GJS-AP) under the auspices of the Commission for Technical and Vocational Education and Training (CTVET). This initiative benefited registered apprentices from several associations, including the Ghana National Tailors and Dressmakers Association (GNTDA), Ghana Cooperative Fashion Designers Association (GCFDA), Ghana Electronics Servicing Technicians' Association Hairdressers (GESTA). Ghana & Beauticians Association (GHABA). National Association of Beauticians & Hairdressers (NABH), and the Ghana National Association of Garages (GNAG). The primary objective of the first phase of the GJS-AP was to provide training that would enable apprentices to earn National Proficiency Level 1 certificates across six trade areas namely: Garment Making, Consumer Electronics, Cosmetology, Welding and Fabrication, Automotive Engineering, and Furniture Making. Although a total of two hundred (200) apprentices enrolled in programme, one hundred seventy-eight (178) successfully completed training across all units in their respective trade areas.



#### Reconstitution of the Governing Council of the University

The Governing Council of Ho Technical University has been reconstituted following the dissolution of memberships for statutory boards, corporations, commissions, and councils, a process mandated by the Presidential (Transition) Act, 2012 (Act 845), upon the assumption of office by President John Dramani Mahama on 7<sup>th</sup> January, 2025. The newly constituted HTU Governing Council was inaugurated in Accra, on 14<sup>th</sup> August, 2025, by the Hon. Minister for Education, Mr. Haruna Iddrisu. The Council is being chaired by Prof. Smile Dzisi, who currently serves as the Deputy Director-General of the Ghana Education Service.



#### Orientation Programme for Members of HTU Governing Council

An orientation programme for members of the Governing Council was held from 1<sup>st</sup>-2<sup>nd</sup> September 2025 at Sogakofe in the Volta Region. Prof. Emmanuel Adow Obeng, a distinguished scholar, researcher, and former Vice-Chancellor of the University of Cape Coast (UCC) served as the main Facilitator for the orientation programme. The programme served as a platform for the new members of Council to familiarize themselves with the University's history, vision, mission, and strategic objectives. It also provided valuable insights into the University's achievements, potential avenues for growth, existing challenges, and key strategies the Governing Council could adopt to support the University's progress and advancement.



#### Human Capital Development

The academic staff profile of the University has improved significantly over the past few years. In 2019, there were only fourteen (14) Faculty with doctoral qualifications, a figure that has now increased to over ninety (90). Initially, the sole professorial role was held by the Vice-Chancellor. However, the current Faculty now includes one (1) Professor, eleven (11) Associate Professors, fifty-one (51) Senior Lecturers and five (5) Deputy Registrars. The Vice-Chancellor remains committed to ensuring that at least 80% of Faculty hold PhDs by the end of his second term. Further, the University granted study leave and various forms of sponsorship to some Faculty and Staff to pursue further academic qualifications and professional enhancement during the review period. This commitment to continuous learning reflects the University's dedication to fostering a knowledgeable and skilled workforce.

#### Promotions and Contract Renewals

During the period under review, deserving and qualified faculty and staff were promoted in line with the relevant provisions in the HTU Statutes and the Scheme of Service. Faculty who demonstrated exceptional teaching abilities, innovative research, and a commitment to student mentorship were among those recognized in this round of promotions. Also, the University made some strategic Faculty appointments, designed to strengthen our academic team. These appointments were pivotal in bridging gaps in various departments, ensuring that our students receive quality education from knowledgeable and experienced professionals. Furthermore, the University renewed contracts for Faculty and Administrative/Professional classes under the Registrary. Overall, these efforts not only recognize individual achievements but also serve to strengthen the University's mission to deliver quality education. foster research initiatives, and support a vibrant academic community.

#### Continuing Professional Development (CPD) of Faculty and Staff

The University organized a series of capacity building workshops aimed at enhancing the skills and knowledge of Faculty and Staff. A key highlight of these workshops was the Research Capacity Building Seminar that took place on 28th April, 2025, at the STAR C. The seminar focused on a critical theme: "Bridging the Knowledge Divide: Identifying and Writing Research Gaps, Theoretical Grounding, Practical Contributions in **Academic Research."** This theme aimed to equip participants with the necessary tools to navigate the complexities of academic research effectively. Prof. Moses Acquaah, a distinguished faculty member from the University of North Carolina at Greensboro, USA, served as Facilitator.

Additionally, a two-day workshop focused on building Artificial Intelligence (AI) capacity was held for the Faculty and Staff of the University from 9th -13th, June, 2025, at the STAR-C. This workshop provided participants with essential skills to enhance their teaching, research, and administrative functions using AI tools. Facilitators from the Vanuatu Trade Commission guided attendees through the basics of AI, and a variety of tools designed to boost productivity in both academic and non-academic settings. Fully sponsored by the Vanuatu Trade Commission, the training programme highlighted the pressing necessity to adopt AI as a transformative element across all fields. The AI workshop is part of a larger cooperation agreement between HTU and the Vanuatu Trade Commission, which aims to promote research, foster innovation, and facilitate digital transformation within Ghana's higher education landscape.

Also, on Wednesday, 14<sup>th</sup> May, 2025, a Customer Service Workshop for staff working at the Production Units of the University was held in the Seminar Room of the HTU Graduate School. This workshop was organized as part of our ongoing commitment to enhancing efficiency and the delivery of good customer service to our stakeholders. The workshop was facilitated by Dr. Stanley Glate, Ms. Jewel Novixoxo, and Dr. Francis Nutsugah of the Department of Marketing of HTU Business School.

Further, on 2<sup>nd</sup> May, 2025, a capacity building training workshop was conducted for faculty and staff at the University Library, on the theme "Elevating Service: Customer Care in Academic Libraries". Dr. Amy Asimah, the Librarian at the Regional Maritime University, served as the Facilitator.

Again, a training programme was conducted by the ICT Directorate for newly appointed faculty members on 20<sup>th</sup> February, 2025, in the Seminar Room of the Graduate School. The primary focus of the training was on the effective use of the HTU Learning Management System (LMS) and the Student Online Information System (SOIS). The overarching aim was to cultivate a more interactive, engaging, and innovative teaching and learning environment in the classroom.

Additionally, on 5<sup>th</sup> March, 2025, a specialized capacity building training workshop was held specifically for all Hall Administrators and Hall Masters of the University. This training was organized by the ICT Directorate, underscoring its commitment to empowering all staff members with the knowledge and tools necessary for effective management within their respective roles.

Furthermore, Mr. Emmanuel Tawiah Aboagye and Mr. Emmanuel Amankwah, both Technical Staff of the Commission for Technical and Vocational Education and Training (CTVET), facilitated a capacity-building workshop focused on the Implementation Standards for Competency-Based Training (CBT) at the tertiary level. This important event took place from Monday, 24<sup>th</sup> February, 2025, to Tuesday, 25<sup>th</sup> February, 2025. The workshop was designed specifically for lecturers who had previously undergone specialized training in CBT facilitation, equipping them with the vital knowledge and skills necessary to implement these standards effectively within the institution.

#### Acquisition of Academic Gowns for the University

The University has successfully acquired customized academic gowns for convocation. This strategic investment by Management, consists of two hundred (200) PhD gowns and three hundred (300) Master's degree gowns. The acquisition of the gowns represents a significant milestone, as it eliminates the ongoing costs associated with hiring academic gowns for graduation ceremonies and other institutional events that require the use of academic gowns. By this investment, Management anticipates considerable cost savings over time, which can be redirected to support other academic programmes and initiatives.



#### New Uniforms and Accouragements for Security Unit

Management procured new uniforms and related accoutrements for the Security Unit during the period under review. The unveiling of the new uniforms, which included sturdy brown boots, took place during a brief ceremony on Monday, 18th August, 2025, at the forecourt of the F. O. Kwami Block. The event also featured the presentation of raincoats, torchlights, and two electronic hand-held body scanners, all aimed at bolstering the effectiveness of the security operations on campus. This latest initiative builds on an earlier effort from 2024, when Management provided branded polo shirts for security staff to wear as part of their designated 'Friday wear.' The introduction of these new uniforms is a strategic move designed to enhance the visibility and operational efficiency of security personnel, ultimately fostering a safer and more secure environment for the entire university community.

#### Update on the Establishment of Baby Friendly Facility

Plans are underway for the establishment of a baby-friendly facility on campus. This much-anticipated facility aims to create a nurturing and secure environment where nursing mothers can care for their infants while continuing to fulfil their academic and professional obligations. The facility will be equipped with comfortable spaces for feeding, changing, and settling babies, alongside areas for mothers to study or engage in work-related tasks. The architectural drawings and designs for the facility have undergone thorough review by Management and relevant stakeholders to ensure that it meets the needs of our community effectively. It is anticipated that the project will be completed within the third quarter of the year, 2025, to provide an invaluable resource for nursing mothers on campus.

#### Automatic Weather Station for the University

The University has received an advanced automatic weather station from Africa Climate AI (AfriClimate AI), marking a significant milestone in our commitment to climate research and sustainability. This generous donation was made possible through the efforts of Ing. Benjamin Wullobayi Dekongmen, a lecturer in the

Department of Agricultural Engineering at HTU, during his participation in the 2025 AfriClimate AI conference in Kigali, Rwanda. The facility is expected to enhance the accuracy of weather forecasts, benefiting both the university community and the surrounding regions. These forecasts will be disseminated through the VP FM radio station and various social media platforms associated with the university. The equipment was officially presented to Management during a brief ceremony on Tuesday, 16<sup>th</sup> September, 2025.

#### Renovation of the SRC-JCR

The HTU SRC is undergoing an extensive renovation to enhance the facility's overall appearance and functionality. This project is aimed at creating a more inviting and engaging space for students. The first phase of the renovation works has been successfully completed. Looking ahead, the second phase of the project is scheduled to commence in the first quarter of 2026. This phase will focus on further improvements, including improved furniture arrangements and the addition of modern amenities. The goal is to create a multifunctional area that supports academic pursuits, social interactions, and student events. The renovation project is being financed by the HTU Student Representative Council (SRC).

# PARTNERSHIPS AND INTERNATIONALIZATION

#### Update on Partnership with KOAMI

On 25<sup>th</sup> March, 2025, the Vice-Chancellor, Prof. Ben Honyenuga, and his Management Team hosted a delegation from the Korea Association of Machinery Industry (KOAMI). This meeting was part of efforts to explore potential collaboration opportunities in the renewable energy sector. The delegation was led by Ing. Seth Mahu, the Director for Renewable Energy and Green Transitions at the Ministry of Energy and Green Transition.



#### Update on Partnership with the African Baobab Alliance (ABA)

Prof. Kenneth Egbadzor represented the University at the 2025 Global Baobab Congress, which took place in Senegal from 4<sup>th</sup> - 6<sup>th</sup> February, 2025. Several stakeholders involved in the baobab value chain, including members from various regions such as Africa, Europe, and America, alongside key government officials from Senegal participated in the congress. During the three-day congress, participants engaged in in-depth discussions that focused on the current landscape of the baobab industry. Topics included not only the existing challenges faced by producers but also the immense prospects for growth and sustainability within the sector. A particular emphasis was placed on strategies to enhance the quality of baobab products, ensuring they meet international standards while also benefiting local communities. The collaborative environment fostered valuable exchanges of ideas, innovative solutions, and the establishment of partnerships aimed at promoting the ecological and economic potential of baobab resources.

#### Update on Partnership with the Hamm-Lippstadt University of Applied Sciences in Germany:

As part of the University's ongoing collaboration with Hamm-Lippstadt University of Applied Sciences in Germany, Mr. Tony Hlofenu, a final-year student in the Department of Mechanical Engineering, had the opportunity to represent our institution at the 2025 Summer School in Germany, dubbed 'The Business of German Engineering.' This programme took place from 3<sup>rd</sup> -22<sup>nd</sup> July, 2025, and provided participants with a comprehensive understanding of the intricacies and innovations within the German engineering landscape. This experience not only enhanced Mr. Hlofenu's understanding of international engineering practices but also represented a significant milestone in his academic journey, contributing to his development as a well-rounded engineer prepared to tackle global challenges. His participation underscores University's commitment to fostering international collaboration and providing students with global learning experiences.

#### Update on Partnership with Ghana Navy

A Matriculation Ceremony for the 7<sup>th</sup> cohort of students at the Naval Training Command in Nutekpor took place on 17th September, 2025. This event highlighted the ongoing partnership between HTU and NAVTRAC, with ninety-seven (97) Naval men and women officially enrolling in certificate and diploma programmes in Logistics and Supply, Hospitality Management, and Secretaryship and Management Studies. The new students were admitted into the HTU Business School as well as the Faculty of Applied Sciences and Technology. marking a significant step in their academic and professional journeys. The collaboration between HTU and the Ghana Navy extends far beyond a typical partnership. This alliance is dedicated to equipping our students, as well as the dedicated naval personnel, with the skills and knowledge necessary to navigate and address the complexities of an ever-changing global environment.

#### Update on Partnership with Design and Technology Institute (DTI)

Implementation of Phase II of the Transforming Youth TVET Livelihoods Project

During the review period, the University (HTU) strengthened its collaboration with the Design and Technology Institute (DTI) to promote Technical and Vocational Education and Training (TVET) in the Volta Region. A significant meeting of Management with the leadership of DTI was held on Tuesday, 14<sup>th</sup> January, 2025, where discussions centered around the initiation of Phase II of the Transforming Youth TVET Livelihoods project. As part of the project implementation, a total of 525 Master Craft Persons (MCPs) and Small and Medium Scale Enterprises (SMEs) were successfully trained in Ho, Akatsi, Sogakofe, Keta, Anloga, and Aflao within the year. These participants have been equipped with essential Precision Quality (PQ) skills and knowledge to enable them compete effectively on the global stage in various trades, including Welding and Fabrication, Auto Mechanics, Fashion and Tailoring, Hospitality, Agro Processing, and Upholstery.

#### Other key actions planned under this project include, but not limited to the following:

- Retooling laboratories in selected departments.
- Enhancing the Career Development Office with resources to support students in their career paths.
- Training 1,575 master craftsmen and SMEs over three years in areas such as metal fabrication, mechanical engineering, tailoring, hospitality, and food processing.
- Organizing pitching contests to offer seed capital for innovative business ideas.
- Implementing a six-month Precision Internship to help unemployed alumni gain skills for better employment opportunities.
- Providing resources for selected learners to start small businesses, including start-up kits.

#### Establishment of PO Innovation Hub.

A Precision Quality (PQ) Innovation Hub has been established at Ho Technical University in collaboration with the Design and Technology Institute (DTI), as part of the MasterCard Young African Work (YAW) initiative. This initiative seeks to position HTU as a key centre for fostering innovation, entrepreneurship, and workforce readiness among students, interns, and informal sector participants. The initiative emphasizes promoting youth entrepreneurship through the Business Incubation Hub Apprentices Model, which specifically supports youth-led enterprises. Additionally, it aims to enhance the skills of master craftsmen and small and medium-sized enterprises (SMEs) to align with industry standards and tackle real-life challenges within their communities. To support this project, some selected departments in the University have been retooled to improve hands-on training opportunities for students.

The visit aimed to foster cultural exchange and deepen academic collaboration between our institutions. During their stay, the students participated in a variety of activities designed to enhance their understanding of our academic programs and campus life. To further immerse them in our local and institutional culture, the University organized guided tours of significant landmarks in the area, showcasing our history and heritage. Additionally, the students had the opportunity to collaborate on short-term projects with our own students, encouraging dialogue and sharing of diverse perspectives. We look forward to continuing this collaboration and exploring new opportunities for joint initiatives in the future.

#### Update on Partnership with Ho Teaching Hospital

#### 2025 EduRank Rankings

EduRank's 2025 rankings of the best universities in the world based on their reputation, research performance, and alumni impact, has also ranked HTU as the Best Technical University in Ghana. EduRank.org is an independent metric-based ranking of 14,131 universities from 183 countries. It is worth noting that HTU was also ranked as the Best Technical University in Ghana in the 2024 Rankings.

#### 2024 Green Metric World University Rankings

The 2024 Green Metric World University Rankings has ranked HTU as the No.1 University in Ghana and the 7<sup>th</sup> Best University in West Africa. #### Working Visit of ISA Officials

Officials from the International Solar Alliance (ISA) visited Ho Technical University (HTU) on Friday, 5th September 2025, to assess the newly established Solar Technology Application Resource Centre (STAR-C). The delegation, led by Ing. Seth Mahu, Director of Renewable Energy and Green Transition at the Ministry of Energy, included Dr. Gurleen Kaur, Technology and Solar Specialist, and Dr. Ishan Purohit, Programme Specialist. During the visit, discussions focused on expanding the current collaboration to include staff and student exchange programs with the Indian Institute of Technology (IIT) Delhi. This collaboration aligns with IIT Delhi's role in coordinating foundational solar training programs under the STAR-C framework. Afterward, the team toured the

STAR-C and other campus facilities, interacting with Faculty and Staff to explore the university's technical capabilities in delivering solar training and conducting research. This visit is part of a broader initiative to strengthen Ghana's position in renewable energy development and enhance institutional capacity for solar education across the sub-region.





### CONCERNS/ CHALLENGES

#### Stalled GETFund Projects at HTU

The protracted delays in completing stalled GETFund projects on campus continues to pose significant challenges for Faculty, Staff and Students. Fortunately, following an appeal by Management, the contractors secured the necessary approvals from the Central Tender Review Committee for their revised rates and have returned to the site. It is our hope that this renewed momentum will enable the swift completion of the various projects, allowing us to enhance our campus facilities and better serve our students and faculty.

#### High Cost of Teaching and Learning Materials

The increasing costs associated with teaching and learning materials, along with vital equipment and software, present considerable challenges for our university. Management is actively seeking support from partners and stakeholders to help mitigate this financial strain. Contributions in the form of funding, resources, or any additional assistance would be immensely valuable. Such support is crucial for ensuring that both faculty and students have access to the essential tools and materials needed to enrich their teaching and learning experiences.

#### Additional Responsibility on the University to pay IGF-related Allowances

The University is also tasked with the important responsibility of paying IGF-related allowances to eligible faculty and staff. This obligation has become increasingly challenging, especially in light of our current fiscal and economic constraints. Nonetheless, Management is employing a range of strategies to address this issue. The approach encompasses diligent budget management, seeking alternative funding sources, and optimizing operational efficiencies. These measures aim to ensure that the University meets its commitments to Faculty, Staff and Students while effectively navigating the financial landscape.

#### Transport Challenges

The current fleet of vehicles of the University is primarily comprised of overage and inadequate models, creating significant challenges for officials who must undertake official trips. The frequent breakdowns and maintenance issues associated with these aging vehicles can lead to delays and disruptions in official duties, hampering the University's operations. Furthermore, the lack of sufficient vehicles limits the University's ability to effectively coordinate and participate in important events, conferences, and outreach programmes that are crucial for its growth and reputation. These challenges are worsened by the potential safety risks involved. Addressing these transport challenges is essential for ensuring that the University can operate smoothly and that its Faculty, Staff and Students can travel with peace of mind and the assurance of safety while representing the University.

#### Absence of a Teaching Hotel

The University is confronted with an urgent requirement to establish a 20-room Teaching Hotel, which will function not only as a practical training facility but also as a Centre of Excellence. We are optimistic that our stakeholders and partners will extend their support to help bring this project to fruition.




#### **Admissions Distribution**

2023/2024 vs 2024/2025 ACADEMIC YEARS









#### **Admissions Trend by Level of Programmes**



#### **Rate of Change of Admissions**








### **3-Year Admissions Trend of STEM Programmes**









## **Performance of Graduates by Class**






#### **4-Year Graduation Trend of Postgraduate Students**
